Firms navigating in the borderland between formality and informality

- 1. Policy actions seeking informal enterprise formalization have limited effects on business formalization; moreover formalization does not improve business performance. (*This thesis*).
- 2. Formal and informal dimensions of the economy overlap identifying a space of ambiguity where economic agents can simultaneously engage with both formality and informality. (*This thesis*).
- 3. The existence of several degrees of (in)formality allows economic agents to engage with (in)formality at various levels. (*This thesis*).
- 4. Given 2 and 3, hybrid entrepreneurial forms can be identified. (*This thesis*).
- 5. Higher degrees of formality are associated with larger size, higher human capital, enhanced policy participation and improved civic engagement. (*This thesis*).
- 6. Knowledge production can proceed with an iterative process that assesses the empirical capacity of the hypothesis/model/theory and refines it.
- 7. Structures and agency interact giving place to a cyclical process resulting in structural changes and agency shifts.
- 8. A key aspect for developing a more comprehensive understanding of social phenomena is the integration of quantitative and qualitative methods.
- 9. Systematic reviews and meta-analyses represent efficient methods for maximizing knowledge on a specific topic/area and for coping with the increasingly abundant production of academic papers.
- 10. Integrating different social sciences is essential for conducting research in development studies.
- 11. Informal agents are on the frontline of environmental issues and climate change; as they are very vulnerable, they are strategic for addressing the most imminent challenges.
